Here's a look at the great team that ABC has advocating on legislation and government regulation on your behalf:

Clifford Webster, Principal, Carney Badley Spellman, PS

Clifford Webster was hired to lobby for ABC by current ABC National President Jim Elmer in 1988. Cliff heads the legislative and administrative practice group at Carney Badley Spellman. Bill Summaries

Bills from the 2009 - 2010 Legislative Sessions

Senate Bill 5873 - Apprenticeship utilization

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed Senate (28-18), Passed House (63-34), Governor signed into law

On state and school district public works projects estimated to cost \$1 million or more, at least 15 percent of the labor hours must be performed by apprentices, unless deemed unfeasible, such as a lack of available apprentices in the area. A bidder will be disqualified if the bidder was found out of compliance in the one-year period preceding the date of the bid solicitation for working apprentices out of ratio, without appropriate supervision, or outside their approved work processes. ABC supports apprenticeship as a training model, but not apprenticeship mandates that disadvantage open shop contractors.

House Bill 1393 / Senate Bill 5895 - Residential construction liability

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: HB 1393 Passed House (52-45), SB 5895 Passed Senate (25-24)

These two bills, similar in scope and effect, would have created a home construction consumer education office, increased warranty protections, increased contractor registration requirements, and established worker certification standards. These bills would have increased liability for residential contractors, and in some cases commercial contractors, with negative impacts on the price and availability of insurance products for the construction industry. The final version of this bill did not reach a House vote.

Senate Bill 6173 - Sales tax compliance / seller's permit

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed Senate (26-21), Passed House (86-9), Governor signed into law

This bill eliminated the requirement for a resale certificate to make sales tax exempt purchases, replacing it with a seller's permit issued by the Department of Revenue. Permits for many of the affected industries may be renewed every four years, but contractors are forced to reapply annually, which is why ABC opposed this legislation.

Senate Bill 6508 - Wrongful death expansion

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed House (58-39-1), Passed Senate (30-18-1)

This bill increases liability for contractors by removing the age limit for recovering damages in the wrongful death of child at age 18 and also would allow for recovery of non-economic damages in these claims. The Liability Reform Coalition worked with state and local governments to amend the bill to eliminate joint and several liability for government entities for these new claims. The bill died when the House refused to accept the amendment and the Senate refused to approve the bill without this limit on government liability.

Senate Bill 6035 - Retrospective rating programs

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed Senate (25-24)

A miscalculation by the Department of L&I depleted the industrial insurance Accident Fund between \$100 million and \$150 million and set base premiums higher than would otherwise be necessary. This bill required the department to conduct an actuarial review of the industrial insurance retrospective rating program and added additional administrative burdens on retro rating group sponsors. ABC opposed this bill because it was an unnecessary and inappropriate intrusion into a contractual relationship between business associations and their retro program members. The bill died in the House.

Senate Bill 5613 - Expanding stop work orders scope

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed Senate (31-17), Passed House (60-38), Governor signed into law

This bill authorized the Department of L&I to issue stop work orders for contractors, who after investigation, failed to secure payment on industrial insurance compensation premiums. Though ABC supports enforcement of contractor registration and industrial insurance laws, the bill granted broad new authority to the department with vaguely defined investigative powers.

Bill Summaries

Bills from the 2009 - 2010 Legislative Sessions

House Bill 1836 / House Bill 2805 - Off-site prefabrication

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: HB 1836 Passed House (61-36), Failed Senate (24-23)

HB 2805 Passed House (54-43), Passed Senate (28-18), Governor signed into law

Public works contracts estimated to cost over \$1 million must contain a provision requiring contractors and subcontractors to submit information regarding any off-site, prefabricated, nonstandard, project-specific items to the Department of L&I. These bills were part of a multi-year effort to expose contractors who supply projects using materials and labor not subject to Washington's prevailing wage laws. ABC opposed this bill because the language included ambiguities, unnecessary requirements and penalties on contractors doing public works projects.

Senate Bill 5963 - Unemployment insurance (House-passed version)

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed House (53-45) Final version signed by Governor into law

The new law brings Washington into conformity with federal requirements by charging employers and paying worker benefits at the same two-quarter averaging, lowering the top tax rates and clarifying the voluntary quits issues. As the bill passed the House originally, it included costly new changes to benefits. These changes were ultimately removed from the final version of the bill.

Senate Bill 6130 - Suspension of 2/3 majority vote for tax increases

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed Senate (26-22), Passed House (51-47), Governor signed into law

This bill temporarily suspended Initiative 960, which requires a 2/3 majority vote for any tax increase. It included an emergency clause, so the bill took effect immediately. After July 1, 2011, the 2/3 majority will be reinstated.

Senate Bill 6143 - \$800 million tax package

ABC Position: Oppose / Result: Passed Senate (25-23), Passed House (52-45), Governor signed into law

More than 2/3 of the new revenue (\$513 million annually) comes from new or additional taxes on businesses. These include a 20-percent increase in the business and occupation tax on service businesses (from 1.5 percent to 1.8 percent), which is the single largest new tax in the package (raising nearly \$250 million annually). The increased taxes on businesses also include provisions changing the minimum standards for determining "nexus" for tax purposes (\$85 million) and additional authority for the Department of Revenue to disregard certain kinds of tax transactions (\$9 million) - although the tax avoidance provisions have been narrowed significantly from prior versions. The other third of the new revenue (\$260 million annually) comes from a variety of new taxes on consumer products, including bottled water (\$33 million), candy and gum (\$31 million), beer (\$60 million), soda pop (\$34 million) and cigarettes (\$101 million).

Amendment to Senate Bill 6575 - Amendment 1503 by Rep. Clibborn - Underground economy taskforce recommendations

ABC Position: Support / Result: Passed House (58-40) Final version vetoed by Governor

The Joint Legislative Task Force on the Underground Economy in the Construction Industry endorsed this bill to modify penalties for unregistered contractors. Though the original bill was agreed upon through the task force process, it was amended in the House Commerce & Labor Committee to include a provision effectively prohibiting the use of more than two subcontractors on one aspect of a construction project, an issue that was not agreed to by the task force. ABC and the Washington Construction Industry Council supported this amendment which removed the contentious section and returned the bill to its original form.

Commerce and Labor Committees

Many bills on which ABC advocates begin the legislative process in the commerce and labor committees in both the House and Senate. There were a variety of significant bills in these committees that were never brought to a full vote of either chamber, therefore weren't used in the calculation of this voting record. This section is designed to briefly describe these bills and to better recognize the legislators that stood with ABC in supporting the free enterprise system by voting against these bills in committee.

House Bill 1992: Expanded prevailing wage to private construction projects involving tax incentives, loans or public land or property that is sold or leased. *ABC Position: Oppose. Committee action: Do pass. (voting nay: Condotta, Crouse, Chandler)*

House Bill 1520 / Senate Bill 5446: Restricting communications from employers and employees in regards to labor matters. *ABC Position: Oppose. Committee action: Do pass. (voting nay House: Condotta, Crouse, Chandler. Senate: Holmquist, Honeyford, King)*

House Bill 2950: Reforming Washington's workers' compensation system by authorizing voluntary medical provider networks, voluntary settlement agreements and refining the definition of occupational disease. *ABC Position: Support. Committee action: No hearing allowed by Chairman Steve Conway.*

We would like to recognize the following legislators for standing with ABC to uphold the free enterprise system: Rep. Condotta, Rep. Crouse, Rep. Chandler, Sen. Holmquist, Sen. Honeyford, and Sen. King.
